his December we will celebrate the finish of 3 years together as Pastor/Teacher and Congregation. I am so pleased with the vast majority of your positive reactions towards my worship leading, our Fellowship, administration, and my pastoral care. One offer I always hope you will receive and utilize is my pastoral care. What is that? In the vast number of instances, pastoral care is me being your most devoted listener. I won't just hear you, but I will listen intently and offer the kind of reaction that you and I discuss prior to your revelations to me. 
Children's Sunday School

Emmanuel grows greener

On August 18 we launched Emmanuel's "Care for the Earth," to help us find new ways to celebrate and nurture the natural world.



We began during Fellowship Hour by celebrating "All things Birds." We

enjoyed deviled eggs, bird nest cookies and "bird seed." We shared bird magazines, a bird word puzzle, and found a home for a bluebird house. Best of all, we shared some powerful stories of birds – from Karen Unger's story of a lasting friendship with a cardinal to Jenny Myers's longtime connection with doves, and Judy Dubs's devastation over seeing a bird's nest destroyed by tree trimmers. Our green table appeared for the first time on August 18. Six members "planted" suggestions for discussion topics and projects in the flowerpot, and three signed up for our Green Team, which will implement suggestions and consider steps we can take to become a UCC Creation Justice Church. We also look forward to participating in the Season of Creation, September 1 to October 4, when Christians




around the world pray and act to protect creation.

An ongoing green project at Emmanuel is caring for the church's flower beds. Research tells us that gardening can have a calming effect, and repetitive tasks such as weeding can be meditative, allowing the mind to focus and unwind. Exposure to sunlight boosts mood, and caring for plants can provide a sense of purpose and satisfaction. You don't have to have a garden of your own, or be an expert gardener, to join in helping to weed and water our church flower beds. Neighbors in Need special offering

Through the Neighbors in Need special missions offering, the UCC helps its members live out their faith with acts of service and ministries of justice and compassion.

In 2024, the Neighbors in Need theme is "Mental Health Justice For All" In 2015, the General Synod of the UCC passed a resolution to become WISE - Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged – for mental health. A just world for all is a world where the human rights and well-being of people with mental health challenges are respected, no matter who you are or where you are in life's mental health journey.

Two-thirds of your donation to NIN funds a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. They include support of health care, voting rights, civil liberties and environmental justice.

One-third supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Forbears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota and other Indian tribes in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal congregation in Minneapolis.

Keystone Conference

Four Pa. conferences move toward merger

Together

We Are Stronge

E arlier this year, the four United Church of Christ conferences in Pennsylvania gathered for their first shared annual meetings. It was one step toward the possibility of forming a new, combined conference from the Penn West, Penn Central, Pennsylvania Southeast, and Penn Northeast Conferences.

The theme – "Together we are stronger" – was echoed throughout the visual displays and collective worship at their June 7-9 gathering in State College.

"It was one the most amazing experiences I've had in the course of my life in ministry," said the Rev. David Ackerman, Penn West Conference minister. "It was a tremendous experience – the energy, the Spirit was present. Whether the Keystone vote in November is affirmative or not, we'll always have that."

The gathering of 436 people in-person and 140 online delved into the details of a proposed Keystone conference – items like governance, staffing and finance – and collected feedback from attendees, which will be further addressed in town hall-style meetings this fall.

"What I heard from folks is that they felt connection in ways that they hadn't felt across the conferences in the past. There was energy and hope," said the Rev. Bonnie Bates, conference minister of Penn Northeast.

The official motion that proposes dissolving the current four conferences and creating a new, combined Keystone Conference will be voted on by delegates at each respective conference's gathering in November.

If the motion passes in all four conferences, it will be presented as a resolution to the Governance Committee of the UCC Board of Directors for a delegate vote at the 2025 General Synod in Kansas City.

'Fresh expressions of faith'

Ideas for a "Keystone" Conference – the name a reference to Pennsylvania's state nickname – have been about two years in the making.

It originated with conversation between the conference ministers, who established a study group in October of 2022. This quickly became the Keystone Working Group, consisting of five representatives from each conference who have met regularly since.

"We were all looking at ways to optimize the resources we had and to help our congregations feel better supported and more connected in a time when donations were going down in some places and the church really needs a strong voice," Bates said.

The Keystone resolution describes how "these current times require fresh expressions of faith, rituals, discipleship, and leadership."

"We believe that if we are to encourage and transform the church we know, we must **Continued on next page**

transform ourselves and the denominational structures and expectations we have of them and each other," it states.

The four Pennsylvania conferences have significantly declined in the number of churches, pastors, and funds since their beginnings – factors that the working group believe can be better met by sharing and combining resources. Conference leaders have also witnessed the 2019 establishment of the Southern New England Conference, created when General Synod approved the dissolution of Connecticut, Massachusetts, and Rhode Island Conferences to form the new conference.

"We were talking to our churches about now being the time for shared ministry and realized we need to be talking about this at the conference level too," said the Rev. Carrie Call, Penn Central Conference minister.

While the working group initially considered several different forms for sharing resources, they overwhelmingly opted for fully combining the conferences as the best way to serve congregations, conferences, and pastors, Bates said.

'Together we are stronger'

Given that each conference has its unique attributes and offerings, each could experience different impacts in merging into one.

For instance, the Rev. William Worley, Pennsylvania Southeast Conference minister, described how he can travel anywhere within his conference within an hour and a half, and with the proposal of a statewide geographical area, he has heard fears about losing a sense of intimacy. Others have expressed worries about the mostly small churches that make up each conference getting lost in the mix. And questions have arisen around what shared identity means when churches embody a wide range of perspectives.

And yet, surveys conducted by the working group on topics like theological perspectives, connection to the broader UCC, and how pastors relate to their congregations have revealed that the four conferences are more similar than they are different, according to Bates.

As each conference anticipates its upcoming vote

By the Numbers

- MEMBERSHIP: The United Church of Christ overall declined by 286,100 members from 2012 to 2022, according to the 2023 Statistical Report released by the UCC's Center for Analytics, Research & Development and Data. They currently report approximately 712,000 members nationwide. At its peak in the late 1950s, membership was more than 2.2 million.
- CONGREGATIONS: The Center for Analytics also reports a loss of 551 congregations in recent years. From 2012 to 2022, the UCC went from 5,154 congregations to 4,603 congregations.
- IN PENNSYLVANIA: The state has 549 congregations, or 11.9 percent of all UCC congregations nationwide, the most congregations of any state. PA has approximately 97,000 UCC members, or 13.6 percent of members nationwide.
- IN THE PCC: The Penn Central Conference has 184 congregations and approximately 25,000 members.

Next Step

Saturday, November 9, all four Conferences will meet in their regions to vote on the Keystone Conference Resolution. Stay tuned for details about a Gettysburg Association meeting.

- A 2/3 majority is required for the resolution to pass.
- All 4 Conferences must vote "yes" for the merger to move forward.

in November, the joint annual meeting offered a glimpse of how a Keystone Conference could offer new opportunities.

"The connections that occurred at our joint meeting demonstrated that bringing worship resources, workshop resources, question and answer resources, and gathering people together, we really were stronger than we could have been alone," said Bates. "We really are committed to the 'together we are stronger' vision of who we can be."
