# From the desk of Rev. Ken...

hank you for taking the time to read my words and familiarizing yourself with the upcoming month's activities at church.

On August 28, I will have received my left knee replacement. It was June when I had my right knee replaced. I worked diligently with my physical therapists to gain flexibility and strength as quickly as possible, though a significant part of recovery relies on time. Thank you for the patience and care you have shown to me this summer during some weeks of absence during recovery.

Time – it's a valuable commodity and our greatest of treasures. Remember in our youth how often we couldn't wait for time to pass because we were impatient for the next, big thing to occur. As maturity reigns a great many of our lives, we often long to recover that "wasted" time of youth.

Let's not waste time now as we carry out Jesus' highest priority – LOVE. We observe many churches, denominations, faiths, or ideologies who claim Jesus' or their own heart as their guide to practice, prayer, and priority. We should note as we observe their and our words, actions, and behavior whether it truly reflects Love or if the word love is subconsciously being used to manipulate.

"ALL ARE WELCOME," is almost a universal greeting on places of worship across our land. I was adamant upon arrival that our church sign NOT say that! Instead, I changed the greeting to read,

"WE AFFIRM ALL" now sandwiched between the Pride Flag and the Transgender Pride Flag on the sign in front of the church. While I approve of the words "All are welcome," I do not approve how places of worship lure people in and then advise them that they are welcome only if they conform to patriarchal, Caucasian, or stereotypical male/female gender identities. Without your conformity those places of worship may not force your ouster; however, they will show you hostility and/or smile at you while they openly denounce your identity – all in the name of "love"!?

Faith" program featuring Bible-based discovery and exploration along with age-appropriate songs, games, crafts and creative play.



This year's Neighbors in Need campaign centers on environmental justice. A major message in the book of Genesis is God's charge to us to care for the earth and all that God created. Today we face challenges of finding cleaner ways to produce energy, limiting our dependence on plastics, the disposal of electronics, and other environmental concerns. A number of UCC churches have become Creation Justice Churches.

(Learn more about one such church in an upcoming bulletin.) Two-thirds of your donation to NIN funds a wide array of local and national justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects. They include support of health care, voting rights, civil liberties and environmental justice. One-third supports the UCC's Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM). Forbears of the UCC established churches and worked with Lakota, Dakota and other Indian tribes in North and South Dakota, Wisconsin and Nebraska. Today there are 20 UCC congregations on reservations and one urban, multi-tribal

#### **CONSISTORY MEETING HIGHLIGHTS**

#### **Consistory Minutes — June**

June minutes were approved at the August meeting.

- Treasurer's Report: Reviewed June 19 budget sheet and Chuck Siegel noted a continued negative trend in Pledges/Offerings. Bill Wertzberger. made a motion to approve pending audit, seconded by Charlotte Pinette. Motion passed unanimously.
- Old Business: Update on State Grant: The final reports were recently filed, concluding work on the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency's Nonprofit Security Grant. Work included new and additional exterior security cameras, including at the cemetery; electrical work to power the new cameras: additional wireless panic buttons; and security and safety training for 12 people. The total spend was \$20,975, all fully reimbursed by the grant. The project lasted 15 months, from February 2022 through May 2023, with every detail -- from the original application to the last fiscal report -- needing to meet state specifications and be supported by documentation. Thank you Linda and Maria for all the detailed work and follow through.
- Investment Committee Policy: A motion was made by Bill Wertzberger to approve the Investment Policy presented by Brian Frederick and the Investment Committee. Motion was seconded by Charlotte Pinette. There were 11 yes votes and no nays. The motion carried and the policy is approved.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS**

#### **Christian Education Committee — August**

- Sunday School was not held during June, July, and August. Volunteers were available for the nursery during those months if needed.
- As of the end of May we had weekly attendance 0-5 children attending each week. The issues we are encountering are children aging out of our program, sports activities, and children who come some weeks but not regularly due to family situations.
- Maria has sent emails to all Children's Ministry Volunteers whose Safe Church clearances will soon expire. Several have already made the updates.
- Our joint Vacation Bible School was held June 19-23 with Trinity UCC. The theme for this year was "Stellar." Children learned about shining Jesus's light no matter what our circumstances and about the solar system. There were 7 adult and 1 junior volunteer from Emmanuel and 5 children with ties to our church attended. We averaged 42 children overall and about 20 total volunteers.

I pray that you begin to be more perceptive of these "macro" or "micro aggressions" all around us in society. This deeply rooted attitude needs to be called out. There was a time when a white person could openly tell a racist joke and never be called on it, as most of us white folk were nervous that we'd somehow be ostracized if we called out the joke teller. Tell a racist joke today and unless you're an outright, outspoken racist, most persons have the dignity and conscience to openly denounce such behavior. And so, we are called by God and Christ and by our own declaration to be aware of aggressions towards any classification of humans and to understand the damage being done towards those humans and the damage to our own dignity and to the well-being of society. Together we can speak openly about these aggressions and to formulate a corporate and/or a personal response- in the name of LOVE.
