From the Penn Central Conference...

Then, because so many people were coming and going that they did not even have a chance to eat, he said to them, "Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest." So they went away by themselves in a boat to a solitary place. But many who saw them leaving recognized them and ran on foot from all the towns and got there ahead of them. When Jesus landed and saw a large crowd, he had compassion on them, because they were like sheep without a shepherd. So, he began teaching them many things. *~Mark 6:31-34*

Greetings Penn Central members and friends,

For years I have longed to have a greenhouse built on my property. This is a place where I can sink my hands into the soil, plant various seeds and watch them bloom into an abundance of hearty fruits and vegetables. This year my husband and two sons helped to build a greenhouse for me to grow my various plants. It has become my sacred space, a place to pray, a place to sing and meditate on the Word. And at the same time, it has become a place to rest. This beautiful little greenhouse allows me to rejuvenate my mind, body and soul. What I've come to realize in my seventeen years of ministry is I like the disciples, fall into extreme busyness that sometimes halts me from caring for my own well-being. As a result, I am unable to properly care for others.

If you follow the lectionary, the Gospel of Mark on July 21 told us the story of how Jesus took his disciples to a deserted place to rest. They were so busy that they didn't even have time to share a meal. Upon their arrival, they were surprised to be greeted by a large crowd in need of prayer, miracles, and healing. Jesus, immediately showed them compassion, recognizing their needs and began to teach them. This leads me to ask the question: What happens to Christians when we become too busy to take time away or even sit down to eat together? We need moments to step back from our individual activities, even those done in the name of Jesus Christ, to reconnect as the body of Christ.

Join the Flock!

When we think of protecting and caring for the natural world, we often think of birds. Many members of our human flock at Emmanuel share a love of birds and a desire to nurture them. It is interesting that the concept of flocking – for support, protection and sharing energy and knowledge, applies to both humans and birds. Like humans, birds know that integration into a larger group will help ensure their survival. Birds are sometimes smarter than humans!

Some of us share our knowledge of birds through photographs. Henry McLin has taken thousands of bird photos. His current favorite is a Cedar Waxwing eating the berries it is known to love.



It is no surprise that many of us are willing to travel beyond our backyards to enjoy the world of birds. Two of Henry's favorite birding destinations are Arizona and Myrtle Beach. Judy Morris says her favorite bird is the penguin – and she has seen plenty of them in their home in Antarctica. She's thinking of a birding trip to Africa. Among other bird travels, Pete Robinson has been to Central America at least a half dozen times.

But you don't have to go far! A great local birding destination is Lake Marburg at Codorus State Park. For \$10 you can enjoy a 90-minute guided pontoon trip. You'll see eagles, ospreys, great blue herons and more! Sign up at the Park Office on Smith Station Road.

were happy and surprised to find a small bird (a wren, possibly) had built a nest in a barberry bush close to their front door. They are keeping the nest just in case it could be used again.

Sally Smith, Viv Hennessy and Peg Moulton know the value of bird baths – and the need to clean them frequently. Sally suggests placing them near shrubs or trees, so the birds feel a bit more protected. Charlotte Pinette says their pond attracts a green heron that builds a well-hidden nest in a nearby tree.

We understand that birds don't really need to be fed in the summer months, but we feed them because of the joy we feel at watching them. Peg Moulton, like many of us, puts out homemade nectar (1/4 cup sugar dissolved in 1 cup water). She adds a warning: change the nectar every few days to prevent possible sickness in hummingbirds. Jim McLin takes a relaxed approach to welcoming birds. He says his yard is a bit like a small jungle, so both birds are squirrels are drawn to it.

Karen Unger shares the story of her friendship with a cardinal she named Red. When she hears his call, she opens her back door, shakes her peanut jar, and tosses out a handful of peanuts. Red bites into one and takes it to his nearby mate, who takes it out of his beak. This friendship has been continuing for about a year.

This text interests me because I believe that this passage takes two avenues. The first is that we all need to rest. Rest allows us to be refreshed and be able to do our work more effectively. The second avenue that is simultaneously taken in this passage tells us as Christians that even if we feel the need to rest, if someone is in need of prayer, or hearing the Gospel, we are to honor their request and show them compassion. It is truly a balancing act for all Christians whether you are a minister or you are a lay person. And sometimes as a minister I find that my individual healing takes place when I am called to reach out to someone who is in need. Something happens in the time that I spend with the person and the time when I return home. There is an unexplained spiritual healing that rejuvenates my tired and weary bones.

So now I have this place that I call sacred in the form of a little greenhouse. Although I know that there is healing in sinking my hands into the rich soil and seeing the plants grow into abundance, I also know that when there is a need for the Gospel to be shared, that I am to mirror the actions of Jesus Christ and to go into the world and spread the seeds of the Gospel just like I spread the seeds in my greenhouse. In both cases, it is a spiritual blessing.
